

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2011 - Dr Emma Parkinson-Lawrence

ASMRs mission to “foster excellence in Australian Health and Medical Research (HMR) and to promote community understanding and support of our sector through “public, political and scientific advocacy” continues into its fifty-first year. To be President of the ASMR as the organization celebrated its 50th Anniversary has been both an honour and privilege.

Since its establishment in 1961 the Society has grown and is both stalwart and dynamic. We owe much to successive Boards of Directors for their hard work and commitment to the ideals of the organisation. Integrity and steadfast dedication to the principles and aspirations of the Society are the hallmarks of an organization widely respected in all arenas.

The unprecedented challenges of both a meteorological and fiscal nature have made 2011 an extremely busy year for the ASMR, culminating in the successful launch of a new Deloitte Access Economics Report by the Honourable Mark Butler, Minister for Mental Health and Ageing at Parliament House in Canberra. As you are all aware, ASMRs vision is the implementation of sustained support for Australia’s world class HMR sector. The current model of cyclical funding evokes pressures not only on careers within the sector but also on the basic lifestyle of researchers. The ASMRs new report “Returns on NHMRC Funded Research and Development” provides further support for our evidence based policy platform and campaign to ensure sustained and appropriate funding for Australian HMR. The report looks at five disease groups and estimates the economic benefit returned amid 2040-2050 from NHMRC investment in Health R&D between the years 2000-2010. Key findings include:

Gains in wellbeing

The aversion of 98,426 disability-adjusted life years (DALYs) valued at \$6 billion

Avoidance of direct health expenditure costs

The avoidance of \$581 million in direct health system expenditure

Reduction in indirect costs

The aversion of \$385 million in indirect costs, including productivity losses incurred through premature mortality and morbidity related reductions in workforce participation

Commercialisation

The estimated commercial benefit across the disease groups is \$1.6 billion

With Australia facing unprecedented healthcare costs associated with an ageing population and the escalating burden of chronic diseases, the government has projected that about two-thirds of its spending to 2050 will be on health. While the discovery and implementation of new therapies from HMR will undoubtedly contribute to this increased spend our new report importantly suggests that Health R&D has the potential to slow the burgeoning health expenditure trajectory. Concomitantly, NHMRC funded R&D has the potential to avert a significant proportion of the burden of disease in Australia, which is borne primarily by individuals through morbidity and mortality, but also by society through increased demands on health services.



The other activities your ASMR board has been involved in are outlined in the below “Year in Review”:

- In what seems to be an ongoing annual threat to HMR funding, ASMR began the year with a successful grass roots advocacy campaign to at least maintain, in real terms, investment in the NHMRC in the 2011/2012 Federal Budget. ASMR was diligent in seeking high level advice and continued to present measured and clearly articulated arguments to government.

- ASMR was actively involved in discussions with government and other HMR agencies to set the Terms of Reference (ToR) for the Review of Australian HMR. Members had an opportunity to comment on the proposed ToR and ASMRs detailed response which can be found at (www.asmr.org.au/Submissions.html). Of particular concern to ASMR members was the lack of acknowledgement for the important role of basic research, the engine of progress and an apparent bias toward translational research. Training and career development was also a recurring area of concern. ASMR is pleased with the expert panel chosen to conduct the review however; there was a perceived gap in representation from the clinical sector. ASMR looks forward to the findings from this report including recommendations on an appropriate funding structure and strategies to implement it!

- It was a great privilege to celebrate ASMRs flagship event ASMR MRW® with our 2011 Medallist, Nobel Laureate Professor Barry J Marshall on his tour around the country. At the outset of my career, I did not envisage

an opportunity to travel with a Nobel Prize winner. I am also sure that many of the students Barry spoke to were similarly pleased and delighted with the opportunity enabled by the Medallist tour. It was a pleasure to meet and chat with many of our ASMR members. An endearing feature of our special week is the unique way it brings together researchers, community and government, demystifying the barriers to show that researchers are just people trying to understand how things work and translate their findings to make the world a better place.

■ ASMR has sustained its commitment to the continuing professional development of HMR scientists and has just completed a series of Professional Development Days across the country. This year the focus remained on how to be successful in the NHMRC fellowship scheme but also provided information on alternative career options within the sector. I believe the word "continuing" is very important in the context of professional development...there is always something to learn. This year our Mentoring Program has been opened to early career researchers and I would like to encourage all of our senior members to inform their staff of this opportunity.

An extremely pleasing outcome this year has been the interaction of Australian HMR agencies. A united and positive front will undoubtedly facilitate interaction with government to develop innovative initiatives which link government investment in HMR to the health needs of the population, in order to exploit the full potential of the sector to save both lives and money.

ASMR would like to recognise and thank the RACP for the continued provision of office space "free of charge".

The ASMR Presidency has been both a challenging and rewarding experience and one in which I have learned many things. ASMR operates as a team and I thank the 2011 Board and State Committees for their tireless efforts this year. I wish to also thank all of our members who supported the Society's decisions and initiatives. There are a number of people who have lent their assistance to me throughout this year and I would especially like to thank Dr. Sarah Meachem, Associate Professor Rob Ramsay, Professor Maria Kavallaris, Dr. Mark Hulett and President-elect Dr. Paul Dawson, ASMR Administrative Assistant Priscilla Diment, Maree Overall and ASN events.

My sincerest gratitude must go to ASMR Senior Executive Officer Cath West. Cath is the "heart and soul" of the society and her wealth of experience and unwavering support of ASMR has, there is no doubt in my mind, gone a long way to making the Society what it is today. To ASMRs incoming President, Dr. Paul Dawson, I wish all the very best and know that Paul and his team will continue to present well researched, evidence based and clearly articulated arguments supporting our advocacy to government..... this is what ASMR does and indeed has been doing for the past 50 years. This is why the Society has a well earned reputation for integrity and this is

something more valuable than gold.

Lastly I want to thank my family (Shane, Mum, Archie and my baby son William) for their unwavering help and support this year - words are simply just not enough.

Item 1 - Welcome and Apologies - Dr Alison Butt

Dr Alison Butt opened the Meeting at 12:35pm, welcoming all present and announcing apologies from Dr Peter O'Loughlin, Dr Nik Zeps, Dr Steven Polyak and Dr Kieran Scott.

Item 2 - Confirmation of Minutes of 16/11/09 - Dr Alison Butt

Dr Emma Parkinson-Lawrence moved that the Minutes of the AGM of November 16, 2009 be accepted as a true and accurate reflection of that meeting; seconded by Dr Kristen Nowak.

Item 3 - President's Report - Dr Alison Butt

It has been an enormous privilege and pleasure to serve the ASMR as President this year. Upon reflection, it has also been a very interesting and exciting year to be at the helm of the Society, with almost unprecedented political activities, and a very welcomed and timely focus on reform in Australia's healthcare system. Australia, like many other countries around the world, is grappling with the health challenges presented by our ageing population and seemingly unstoppable escalations in the incidence of chronic diseases. These issues were highlighted this year by the 'Intergenerational Report 2010' released by the Federal Treasurer, Wayne Swan in February. They also underpinned the announcement by the Rudd Government of its National Health Reform Plan - 'A National Health and Hospitals Network for Australia's Future'. But while both reports fully acknowledge the current and future healthcare challenges facing our nation, what is less clear is how we can effectively address them.

One very important facet of the health reform debate that the ASMR has

been strongly advocating for over the past year, is how we can accelerate the translation of our world-class health and medical research into world-class healthcare delivery. Indeed, one of the real obstacles we face in improving our nation's health system, is that the enormous advances in our understanding and treatment of disease are not always being effectively and rapidly translated into better health outcomes. With this in mind, the ASMR has been emphasising to both sides of government that health and medical research - of both a basic and translational nature, should be a pivotal and integral component of a robust, self-improving, 21st century healthcare system. At the nexus of this clinical/research interface is the clinical researcher who provides a vital, two-way conduit between basic research of clinical relevance and its translation into clinical practice.

Surprisingly, there is very little information on the number of clinicians actively engaged in research in Australia – how much of their time is devoted to research or the sources of their research funding.

The ASMR has extended its recently commissioned workforce survey – 'Planning the Health and Medical Research Workforce 2010-2019', to gather such data, and this information will be vital to underpin our arguments to Government for the future sustainable development of the HMR workforce. The data have highlighted the current challenges to combining clinical practice with research – both in terms of time and funding sources. This is an area that the ASMR is very interested in further exploring, and it is certainly an area of interest to government as they start to flesh out some of the details around their plans for hospital-based research.

However, clinical researchers remain only one component of the two-way bridge between the discovery of new knowledge through research, and the implementation of this fundamental knowledge into practice. Thus, the ASMR continues

to strongly advocate for sustainable, realistic funding into the sector - particularly to the HMR workforce, to enable the full realisation of prior investment in this area, and to allow our world-class HMR to be rapidly translated into world-class healthcare delivery.

The ASMR has also been actively engaging the NHMRC surrounding some of the workforce inequities apparent from our Workforce survey – particularly, concerning the paucity of women in senior scientific positions. Our sector is certainly not alone in displaying such demographics, but now that the facts are well established, we need to move forward to identifying and implementing ways in which all areas of our workforce can make productive and effective contributions to the research effort. Mark Butler, the Minister for Mental Health and Ageing specifically mentioned his concerns around this issue when he opened the Congress on Sunday, and the ASMR will continue to work closely with government and the NHMRC to try and address these important issues.

In addition to this domestic focus, the Society has also been outward looking this year – identifying potential opportunities and synergies for HMR funding initiatives in the Asia Pacific region. Based on our prior research into global models of sustainable research funding – in particular, the European Framework 7 program, the ASMR has been exploring the possibilities for similar schemes with our close neighbours in the Asia Pacific. This research effort culminated in a special forum held at the opening of the Congress – entitled 'Framework for the future - An Asia Pacific HMR Funding Union'. It was facilitated by Dr Norman Swan, awarding winning health reporter and broadcaster, and Sir Gus Nossal made a lively introduction to the proceedings via a special video presentation.

We were extremely fortunate to have attracted a highly distinguished

panel of experts to debate this proposal - Dick Woolcott - Former Secretary of the Department of Foreign Affairs & Trade, former Australian Ambassador to Indonesia & the Philippines, former High Commissioner to Malaysia, Ghana & Singapore; Prof. Robyn Norton - Principal Director of The George Institute for Global Health; Prof. Ed Liu - Executive Director, Genome Institute of Singapore; Prof. Kim Mulholland - Menzies School of Health Research, Darwin; Prof. Andrew Cochrane - Chairman, The Hospital of Hope, Timor-Leste; Dr. Rado Faletic - Executive Director, Forum for European-Australian Science & Technology Cooperation).

The panel debated the challenges, opportunities and possibilities of a regional funding initiative for health and medical research and it produced some very lively and thought-provoking discussion. Probably best summed up by Dick Woolcott who concluded that now is the time to turn aspirations into objectives. This is certainly something that the ASMR will be actively pursuing in the future.

A real highlight for me this year was ASMR Medical Research Week®, in particular the ASMR Medallist Tour with Baroness Susan Greenfield. Not only was Susan a complete delight to travel with, but her infectious enthusiasm for research, as well as her thought-provoking communication of the potential for HMR to alleviate the burden of disease, was truly inspiring. Susan spoke to over 1500 researchers, politicians and dignitaries in all state capitals and the ACT, and also strongly advocated on behalf of the HMR sector in an exhausting round of media interviews, reaching nearly 9 million people with the ASMR MRW® message!

In closing, there are many people to thank for their hard work and enthusiasm on behalf of the ASMR this year. All the ASMR state convenors and their hard working

committees; ASN events – in particular Maree Overall and her team; ASMR past presidents for invaluable support and sage advice; the ASMR Directors and Executive for their continued commitment to the Society and its ideals. A very special thank you also goes to Cath West and Priscilla Diment in the ASMR Executive Office for all their tireless efforts and enormous dedication to the ASMR.

We enter the 50th year of the ASMR as a strong and vibrant society with record membership numbers and with a proven track record of effective advocacy on behalf of the sector. I wish incoming President, Emma Parkinson-Lawrence every best wish for another successful year!

Item 4 - Treasurer's Report Dr Emma Parkinson-Lawrence

Dr Parkinson-Lawrence referred the Meeting to the audited Financial Statements contained within the Annual Report of the Society advising that the Society has a trading surplus for the year Financial Year 2009/10 and shows net assets of \$880,255. Professor Maria Kavallaris moved that the Financial Reports be accepted; seconded by Dr Mark Hulett.

Item 5 - ASMR Research Fund - Dr Emma Parkinson-Lawrence

Dr Parkinson-Lawrence again referred the meeting to the audited Financial Statements, advising that the ASMR Research Fund showed a slight trading profit of \$357. The ASMR Research Fund supports two awards per annum, an international award of \$5,000 and a domestic award of \$2,000. The Awards support a postgraduate student member of the Society nearing completion of their studies or a recently graduated postdoctoral member to undertake a short period of research in a distal laboratory.

i) Award Winners 2010
Winners of the ASMR Research Award for 2010 are Dr Ivan Ka Poon

(International) and Dr Justin Lees (Domestic).

Dr Ka Poon will be attending the laboratory of Professor Ravichandran at the University of Virginia looking at "The Role of Heparanase in Regulating Apoptotic Cell Clearance". Dr Justin Lees will visit the laboratory of A/Prof Alison Cowin at the Wound Healing Unit, Women's and Children's Hospital, Adelaide looking at "Wound Healing in a tropomyosin transgenic mouse model".

ii) Award Winners 2009 - Dr Daniel Johnstone (Domestic) and Dr Siobhan Schabrun (International). The winners for 2009 are unfortunately unable to be with us today. Due to the unforeseen late start of the AGM and subsequent time constraints, powerpoint presentations prepared by both Drs Johnstone and Schabrun are unable to be shown. Both recipients have gained valuable experience through these Awards and express their thanks to ASMR.

Item 6 - Subcommittee Reports

a) Research Careers - Drs Roger Yazbek and Juliet Taylor

Dr Juliet Taylor spoke of the 2010 Professional Development Day held during the Australian Health and Medical Research Congress. The theme of the day was "Steps to Success" The key ingredients to running a successful research group Drs Taylor and Yazbek thanked the Facilitator Dr Sarah Meachem and all involved in the organization and presentation of this successful event. Dr Yazbek reported briefly on the Mentor Program which is an online registry of researchers available to mentor early and mid-career researchers.

b) Membership - Dr Daniel Wallace

Dr Wallace reported that membership continues to be strong with 1030 ordinary financial members (up by 3% on last year) and 735 student members (an increase of 29% on last year). Dr Wallace advised that the increased student

membership is a result of the student meetings held this year.

c) Newsletter - Dr Kathy Andrews

Dr Andrews reported that there had been three publications in 2010 with the most recent featuring a very well received article by Professor David Sinclair. Dr Andrews thanked Stephen O'Connor from Artifishal Studios for his excellent work in layout of the Newsletter as well as Cath West and Priscilla Diment. Dr Andrews informed the meeting that she was stepping down from the board and expressed her thanks and best wishes to her colleagues.

d) ASMR MRW® - Associate Professor Naomi Rogers

Dr Rogers expressed the hope that all members had taken part in some of the ASMR MRW® activities around the country in June. She thanked major national sponsors the Department of Health and Aging and National Health and Medical Research Council as well as all state sponsors, for their support. The week could not be the success it is without the hard work of the state committees, the executive office, ASN Pty Ltd, Dr Maree Overall and Claire Cianter. She concluded by thanking Dr Rachel Burt for her assistance.

e) Media - Dr Kristen Nowak

Dr Nowak advised that this report is also on behalf of Catherine West from the Executive Office who plays a major role in this portfolio. She reported on the very successful media coverage for ASMR MRW® with coverage reaching 9M Australians. Dr Nowak advised that she is currently working with Catherine West on media for the Congress.

f) State Reports - Dr Alison Butt

Dr Butt congratulated and thanked all state committees reminding the meeting that the success of ASMR MRW® is a testament to their

dedication and hard work.

g) NSC 2010 - Dr Rosemary Keogh

Dr Keogh advised that the ASMR NSC has co-hosting sessions with Australian Society for Immunology (ASI) and the Australian Society for HIV Medicine (ASHM). The meeting has 175 delegates attending. She thanked the Convenor Dr Gilda Tachedjian and A/Prof Richard Ferrero, Program Convenor as well as sponsors and supporters.

h) AHMRC 2010 - Dr Rosemary Keogh

Dr Keogh reported that the 5th Australian Health and Medical Research Congress has 23 participating organisations, 8 conducting their full meeting and 15 section societies. She expressed her thanks to the Program Convenor Dr Michael Hickey, committee members, sponsors and trade supporters, ASN Events, particularly Dr Maree Overall and Claire Cianter as well as Cath West and Priscilla Diment from the Executive Office. Dr Butt thanked and congratulated Dr Keogh on the success of the Congress.

Item 7 Other Business - Dr Alison Butt

There being no other business, Dr Butt handed the meeting to the incoming President, Dr Emma Parkinson-Lawrence.

Item 8 Directors and Office Bearers 2011 - Dr Emma Parkinson Lawrence

Dr Parkinson-Lawrence thanked Dr Butt for her diligence and hard work in leading the society and moving forward Society initiatives, in particular the very successful Asia Pacific HMR Funding Union Forum. Dr Parkinson-Lawrence presented Dr Butt with her ASMR Past President badge. She thanked also Dr Kathy Andrews for her work on the Board of Directors presenting her with the ASMR Past Director badge.



2. The principal activities of the Society during the course of the financial year were the promotion of interest and support for medical research in Australia. There were no significant changes in the nature of those activities during that period.

3. During the period the Society's activities resulted in a consolidated operating surplus in the amount of \$74,436. At the end of the financial year the Society had net assets of \$954,691. There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Society during the financial period. The Society's accounting policy is on an accruals basis. Accordingly the comparative figures reflect the accruals basis of accounting. During the year, events management was undertaken by ASN Events Pty Limited, on behalf of the Society. On an accruals basis, they have reported net assets of \$152,836, a turnover of \$149,637 and a net profit of \$9,473, after taking into consideration other interest income in the sum of \$5,662. This year, the Australian Health & Medical Research Congress Unit Trust reported net assets of \$150,341, a turnover of \$926,846 and a net profit of \$104,165, after taking into consideration other interest income in the sum of \$19,943.

4. Since the end of the financial year no matter of circumstance has arisen which has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the operations of the Society, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Society in any subsequent financial years.

5. The Society's branch accounting is undertaken by the National Office.

6. The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001 (as amended). The Australian Society for Medical Research complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in their entirety.

7. Since the date of incorporation, no office bearer has received or become entitled to receive a benefit (other than a benefit included in the aggregate amount of emoluments or due and receivable by office bearers shown in the accounts or the fixed salary of a full-time employee of the Society) by reason of the contract made by the Society with the office bearer or with a firm of which he/she is a member, or with a company in which he/she has a substantial financial interest.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE, 2011**

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards (AASBs), Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001 (as amended).

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(A) Going Concern

The Society's financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. At 30th June, 2011, the Society had an excess of current assets over current liabilities. Cash reserves were sufficient to support the Societies operations.

(B) Basis of Preparation

Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards

The Australian Society of Medical Research has prepared financial statements in accordance with the Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented. The entities have however elected to adopt exemptions available under AASB 1 relating to AASB 132: Financial Instruments: Disclosure and Presentation, and AASB 139: Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied, if applicable.

Functional and Presentation Currency

The Society's financial statements are presented in Australian Dollars.

(C) Accounting Policies

Income tax

As the Society is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Property, Plant and Equipment

The Society owns no property or plant. Office equipment is carried at cost value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The carrying amount of office equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the income statement during the financial period in which they are incurred.

The Australian Society for Medical Research is a non profit organisation and there are no changes to its current disclosure requirements under AASB 116 para Aus 77.1.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in the profit and loss on a diminishing basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. The depreciation rate for the current 2011 year and 2010 comparative year are as follows:-

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the directors review the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value.

Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Investments in Associates

Any Investments in associate companies are recognised in the financial statements by applying the equity method of accounting. The equity method of accounting recognises the company's share of post-acquisition reserves of its associates. The company's interests in joint venture entities are brought to account using the cost method.

Members Liability

The Society is limited by guarantee. Every member of the Society undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Society in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he or she is a member or within one year afterwards for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Society contracted before the time at which he or she ceases to be a member and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors amongst themselves such amount as may be required not exceeding the sum of \$20.

Sponsorship

Sponsorship revenue is recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Investment

As a result of complications resulting from the Goods and Services Tax, outsourcing of seminar management is undertaken by ASN Events Pty Limited as trustee for ASMR Events Trust. The Society has invested \$100 in units in ASMR Events Trust, representing all the units issued by the trust.

The Society has also invested \$100 in units in the Australian Health & Medical Research Congress Unit Trust (AHMRC), representing all the units by the trust.

Provisions

Provision are recognised when The Australian Society of Medical Research has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that the outflow of economic benefit will result and that the outflow can be measured reliably.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks or financial institutions, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Service Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST. Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and internally.

Key estimates - Impairment

The directors assess impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the group that may lead to impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Value-in-use calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.
