AWARDS

Young Investigator and Student Awards

A panel of independent referees will review all abstracts submitted by Young Investigator and Student Award nominees. Finalists will be selected (based on average scores) and the highest scoring abstracts, in both the YI and student categories will be asked to prepare an oral presentation (10 minutes to present and 5 minutes for Q&A). These finalists will be judged on their presentation, with the opportunity to win either the YI or Student oral award.

Traditionally the next highest scoring abstracts would be awarded a finalist place in the moderated poster session. This year AAS has decided to increase the value and opportunity for abstract submitters, and will replace the traditional "moderated poster" session for finalists, (whereby they would present in front of their printed poster), with YI and student poster finalists session whereby they will present a 5 minute "mini-oral" presentation (3 minutes to present and 2 minutes Q&A) which will be judged in the same way as previous moderated poster sessions. No more than 5 slides can be presented in this timeframe. You will still have the opportunity to prepare and display your paper poster as well. These finalists will also be judged with the opportunity to win either the YI or Student poster award.

In this way, there are far greater opportunities to present an oral, within the program. Awards will be announced at the Conference Awards Dinner.

Finally, ALL posters accepted will have a dedicated time set aside in the program, to stand by their posters and answer questions to display their work. No awards are available for these poster sessions.

Please note therefore – if you select your preferred option as a **poster** during the abstract submission process, and you do not nominate for an award (or are not eligible) you will be awarded a paper poster only.

If you select your preferred option as a <u>poster</u> during the abstract submission process, and you DO nominate for an award (an are eligible) you may be invited to present up to 5 slides for 3 minutes plus 2 minutes Q&A, should you make the finalist list based on abstract scores. You should still prepare a paper poster for display.

Student Travel Grants

To be considered for a grant you must be a financial student member of the AAS, a full-time student in Australia or New Zealand and presenting at the meeting and be located outside New South Wales.

If a travel grant is approved, available funds will be distributed based on a percentage of the economy return fare (maximum of 50% of return economy fare). A cheque will be available at the meeting.

If you are eligible and wish to be considered for a travel grant, you will have the opportunity to apply for this through the Abstract submission process.

CALL FOR ABSTRACTS BY 28 JULY

All those who wish to present oral or poster communications are invited to submit abstracts. *Deadline for submissions is: midnight Friday 28 July 2017.* It is anticipated that the final program and notification of presentation style will occur the week commencing 21 September 2017.

Submitting an Abstract

Each presenting author will be able to submit up to 3 abstracts as part of the online process.

If you are submitting abstracts on behalf of another person, a separate submission record must be created with a different contact email address.

Information from the online form is utilised to generate the program, so please complete carefully. Presenting authors who have not registered to attend and paid by September 30 will be assumed to have withdrawn their abstract.

Abstract acknowledgement

Receipt of abstracts will be acknowledged by an automated response at the time of submission. If you do not receive an email within 24 hours of abstract submission, please contact Your Secretariat.

Oral Presentations

Oral presentations will be allowed 10 minutes with 5 minutes for questions.

Poster Presentations

Display panels will be provided along with appropriate adhesive. The ideal poster size/orientation is either A0 size (portrait) or A1 size (landscape). Posters must not exceed 1200m in height or width.

Abstract format

Page size must be set to A4

• Abstract should fit into 1 page with Margins:

Top = 2 cm

Bottom = 13 cm

Left = 2 cm

Right = 2 cm

- Apply 0.3cm paragraph indent to the right margin
- Single line spacing must be used throughout
- Ensure all lines, tables and figures fit within the margins
- Single-spaced, justified typing only
- 10pt Arial and symbol fonts only
- Title in ALL CAPS AND BOLD
- One line between title and name/affiliations
- Names in upper and lower case, with family name followed by initials (e.g. Smith AB, Brown CD)
- Affiliations commence on a new line, in italics (e.g. University of Melbourne, Victoria)
- Underline the presenting author's name
- One line between affiliations and body of abstract
- Body of abstract to should contain the headings Background, Aims, Methods and Results, and Conclusions with each heading Bolded and on a new line Please make sure you adhere to the specified format. No editing to correct your errors will occur.

EFFECT OF FISH DIETS AND WEIGHT LOSS ON SERUM LEPTIN CONCENTRATION IN OVERWEIGHT, TREATED-HYPERTENSIVE SUBJECTS

Background: Leptin, a hormone secreted from adipocytes, regulates energy stores and energy balance. Obesity is associated with higher leptin concentrations, and weight loss results in a reduction in leptin levels. Evidence also suggests that fish oils rich in □3 fatty acids lower leptin levels independent of body fat (Winnicki M, et al. Circulation 2002).

Objective: To examine whether dietary fish enhanced the effects of weight loss on serum leptin levels, in 69 overweight, treated hypertensive men and women.

Design: Subjects were randomised to either a daily fish meal (3.65g \square 3 fatty acids), a weight reduction regimen, the two regimens combined or a control group for 16 weeks.

Results: 63 Subjects completed the study. Weight fell by 5.6 kg with energy-restriction. Changes from baseline to post-intervention in serum leptin were 0.60 ± 0.76 ng/ml in the control group, 1.20 ± 0.79 ng/ml in the fish group, -1.40 ± 1.05 ng/ml in the weight-loss group and -5.08 ± 1.64 ng/ml in the fish + weight-loss group. There was a significant fish-weight loss interaction (P=0.008) on post-intervention serum leptin levels after adjustment for baseline levels, which was independent of post-intervention insulin.

Conclusions: A daily fish meal as part of a weight-reducing regimen was more effective than either measure alone at reducing leptin concentration. Cardiovascular risk is likely to be substantially reduced in overweight hypertensives by a weight loss program incorporating fish meals rich in \Box 3 fatty acids.


